Central Nebraska MRC Act F.A.S.T. (First Available Simple Treatment)

In the spirit of preparedness, this month's feature article spotlights an MRC unit that developed an emergency preparedness initiative that involves the community, increases access to care, and strengthens partnership building. Central Nebraska MRC's (CNMRC) Act F.A.S.T. (First Available Simple Treatment) initiative teaches public and private citizens the importance of early bleeding control by training them to use tourniquets and handsonly CPR. Due to the popularity of the training, it is now being taught statewide. The training program was developed by CNMRC as a 2017 Challenge Award project and was later recognized as a NACCHO Promising Practice.

CNMRC volunteers have also distributed Act F.A.S.T. kits throughout the region, including to most schools. The kits include supplies to control severe hemorrhage and are co-located with AEDs. The training also includes practice using tourniquets with a Bleeding Control Simulator (shown below). This hands-on training ensures that participants truly understand the training and improves their chance of successful tourniquet application during real world events. After participants began commenting, "what do we do if we don't have tourniquets?" CNMRC volunteers incorporated a mannequin, 'Alex,' who is dressed as a young student with over 15 articles of clothing and everyday items that can be used as an improvised tourniquet.

About the Unit: Central Nebraska MRC serves a largely rural population of 240,000 citizens spread across 23 counties in Central Nebraska. The MRC has 67 volunteers and is sponsored by the Tri-Cities Medical Response System (TRIMRS), a collaborative effort of area hospitals, public health departments, county emergency managers, not-for-profit agencies, and city government officials dedicated to creating and maintaining a system for responding to public health emergencies.
