





NACCHO'S COMMUNITY IMPACT



NACCHO—the National Association of County & City Health Officials—represents 2,800 local health departments (LHDs), which include more than 13,000 public health professionals, who together provide services to almost three-quarters of the U.S. population.

From community health assessment to infectious disease prevention and control, to climate change and terrorism preparedness, NACCHO's programs and initiatives address the most pressing public health needs. NACCHO supports and strengthens LHDs by providing exceptional experiences, a vibrant community of local public health professionals, best practices, knowledge and future-oriented research, and essential tools that make local health officials and their workforce more successful. In addition, NACCHO's advocacy initiatives both inform public policy and empower local public health officials in communicating effectively with the press and legislators.

Who Belongs to NACCHO?

Every LHD is eligible for organizational membership, which delivers valuable benefits and networking opportunities to senior health officials and staff. In addition, state public health departments, government agencies, nonprofits, schools of public health, and allied for-profit companies are eligible for affiliate membership. We also welcome individuals who have professional ties to the public health field.

NACCHO provides its organizational and individual members with a wealth of resources, from publications and training, to networking and advocacy. As a member, you get the tools you need to meet the challenges of a dynamic and rewarding profession, and effectively serve your local public health constituents.

KEEP UP TO DATE: As part of your membership, you'll receive the quarterly *NACCHO Exchange* and the monthly newsletter *Public Health Dispatch*. Other publications—like the bimonthly *Journal of Public Health Management and Practice*—are available at a discount. In addition, LHD management and staff can access program-specific electronic newsletters such as maternal, child, and adolescent health; environmental health; injury and violence prevention and accreditation and quality improvement.

SHARE IDEAS AND CONNECT WITH PEERS: NACCHO offers many opportunities for education, discussion, and networking.

- The NACCHO Annual Conference brings together more than 1,300 health officials and top decision-makers in the public health field.



- The Peer Assistance Network (PAN) provides a free online service for referrals, advising relationships, and technical assistance.
- Program-specific venues, such as the Protocol for Assessing Community Excellence in Environmental Health, give you the opportunity to exchange focused advice and support.

RECRUIT TOP TALENT AND ADVANCE YOUR CAREER: As part of a strategic partnership with the National Healthcare Career Network (NHCN), NACCHO's Career Network offers employers an efficient way to attract first-rate talent, and gives job seekers an effective way to advance their public health careers. Linking to the job boards of nearly 270 leading healthcare associations, the NHCN works to combat the healthcare workforce shortage and serve as a meaningful recruitment resource for employers.

GET INVOLVED AND RECOGNIZED: NACCHO members have the right to vote, hold office, and represent NACCHO in an official capacity. You have the opportunity to serve on national advisory committees, submit articles to the NACCHO publications, speak at the Annual Conference, and apply for funding and awards. NACCHO's Model Practices Awards honor and

recognize outstanding local health practices from across the nation and promote the sharing of best practices in the public health community.

RECEIVE GRANTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS: Members can receive special assistance through grants for emergency preparedness, food safety, HIV/AIDS prevention, and other programs. Mini-grants for training—from \$500 to \$25,000—help put new skills and knowledge to use.

NACCHO ADVOCACY: STAY INFORMED AND ENGAGED

NACCHO not only keeps you informed about public policy but also empowers you to participate in public health advocacy. Electronic Action Alerts, the Online Legislative Action Center, and “Notes from Washington” keep NACCHO members updated on pressing public health issues and pending federal legislation. You'll also have access to press release templates and policy fact sheets, which provide talking points and guidelines for working effectively with reporters.

From collecting survey data from local health departments across the country to creating the online Toolbox, the Model Practices Database, and the MAPP Handbook, NACCHO makes sure that members benefit from nationwide best practices.

National Profile of Local Health Departments

With 82 percent of LHDs completing a questionnaire on infrastructure and practice, Profile is the most comprehensive and accurate source of information about LHD governance, funding, workforce, activities, services, and more. Practitioners and policymakers, researchers, and the media can use this publication to make local and regional comparisons, educate

the workforce, and publish articles and papers about local public health practice.

Toolbox

NACCHO's Toolbox is a free online collection of local public health tools produced by members of the public health community. Public health professionals and external stakeholders use this Toolbox to inform and improve their work in the promotion and advancement of public health objectives.

Anyone interested can search for documents by state and keyword in any of 26 toolkit topics. These materials and resources include case examples, presentations, fact sheets, drills, evaluations, protocols, templates, reports, and training materials.



MAPP Handbook

Mobilizing for Action through Planning and Partnerships (MAPP) is a community-wide strategic planning process for improving community health. Facilitated by public health leadership, this process helps communities prioritize public health issues and identify resources for addressing them. The MAPP User's Handbook is a planning guide that assists LHDs in developing strategy, complete with worksheets and practical tips from fellow users.

Survive and Thrive: Roadmap for New Local Health Officials

This program combines learning, networking, and individual coaching to enhance the skills of new local health officials (LHOs) and prepare them for the challenges and opportunities of their new role. Over the course of 12 months, the

LHOs engage with seasoned colleagues, learn new skills, and apply practical hands-on experience. Participants take part in webinars, monthly conference calls, and in-person workshops to learn strategies for addressing management challenges, leading and managing change, and working with elected officials. The low tuition is subsidized through generous support from the Robert Wood Johnson and the De Beaumont Foundations.



MODEL PRACTICES: SHARING WHAT WORKS

The NACCHO Model Practices database includes proven initiatives, programs, resources, administrative practices, and tools that address local public health needs. Members can participate in many ways. You can submit an innovative practice developed to meet a particular public health program or concern. You can try out an idea and offer feedback about how it worked for your department. And you can reference the Database in a speech or paper, sharing what works in local public health.
