Highlights of the Month

Site Spotlight: San Ysidro Health

San Ysidro Health is a non-profit organization committed to improving the health and wellbeing of the communities they serve with access for all. They focus on providing highquality, compassionate, accessible, and affordable healthcare and support services for patients of all ages. NACCHO had the opportunity to sit down with Besma Coda, Project Manager for the Health and Promotion Department, to learn a little bit more about their work with refugee, immigrant, and migrant communities. San Ysidro's network expands across San Diego County, California and they serve around 600 districts in this area.

"The East Region Refugee Community COVID Prevention Project is designed to increase education access, acceptance of COVID-19 testing and vaccination among refugees residing in San Diego County in the East Region," said Coda. Although they already have a grasp on how to deal with COVID and COVID fatigue, their goal is to reach more refugees and immigrants in San Diego communities. Another goal of San Ysidro is to provide community education to reduce the COVID-19 infection rates and increase access to reliable resources. Vaccine hesitancy encompasses more than just COVID- they also strive to provide education surrounding other vaccines, like the flu vaccine for example.

Coda also mentioned that their community health workers act as trusted messengers from within the communities they serve. "They are uniquely connected with the patients due to their shared life experiences," said Coda. These community health workers serve as a liaison to both the community and within the internal team at San Ysidro.

Coda mentioned using several different outlets to implement health literacy interventions. Some outlets include social media, radio, and livestream. "We livestreamed every workshop we did. That way not only our community in town, but also people around the country and overseas, were watching our workshops," said Coda.

Coda explained that San Ysidro Health brought in other agencies, such as the county of San Diego, the school district, and local hospitals. By "bringing all of these community organizations, we helped them to bridge the community to the RIM population," said Coda.

In partnership with the University of Minnesota National Resource Center for Refugee, Immigrants, and Migrants (NRC-RIM), NACCHO is pleased to offer a funding opportunity to a consultant to provide training and technical assistance to build capacity of LHDs and CBOs to effectively collaborate with Afghan refugee, immigrant, and migrant communities for improved Afghan community public health.

NACCHO will award up to \$75,000 to a consultant or firm to support funded LHDs and CBOs to conduct resource and network mapping, community, and partner engagement, and develop a subsequent implementation plan to expand, tailor and adapt their services and resources to effectively reach current and future Afghan populations in their communities. As well as to identify successes, challenges, and lessons learned in these mapping and planning processes and disseminate to other jurisdictions. New Webinar and Promising Practices Highlight Partnerships Ideas in Afghan and Muslim Communities

The National Resource Center for Refugees, Immigrants and Migrants (NRC-RIM) is joining the Afghan Health Initiative (AHI) and Seattle King County Public Health (SKCPH) for a webinar titled <u>Culturally Relevant Lead Poisoning Prevention Strategies for Afghan</u> <u>Newcomer Communities</u> on Oct. 18.

The webinar will highlight AHI and SKCPH's partnership to prevent childhood lead poisoning in Afghan communities through a <u>home visit and pressure cooker exchange</u> <u>program</u>, as well as NRC-RIMs <u>lead poisoning collection</u> for Afghans. Participants will learn about how to replicate the home visit program and support it with tailored health communications from NRC-RIM.

Learn from more partnership ideas in NRC-RIM's new promising practice called <u>Effective</u> <u>Strategies for COVID–19 Mitigation in Muslim Faith Communities</u>. Lessons learned from NRC-RIM partner the International Rescue Committee are summarized in five key strategies that support culturally responsive and effective mitigation strategies. NRC-RIM partners at NACCHO are looking for a consultant to provide training and technical assistance to build capacity of health departments and community-based organizations to effectively collaborate with Afghan refugee, immigrant, and migrant communities for improved Afghan community public health. <u>Applications are due</u> Oct. 13. NRC-RIM's Translated COVID-19 Resources Prove Useful in Light of New Vaccines

In light of the FDA and CDC's authorization of new COVID-19 vaccines, organizations may find existing NRC-RIM materials on <u>boosters</u>, <u>waves</u>, <u>variants</u>, and other <u>general</u> <u>COVID-19 vaccine information</u> useful. Customizable and translated into more than 40 languages, these are among their most popular resources to date.

In collaboration with the International Rescue Committee (IRC), NRC-RIM released <u>Know</u> <u>Your Rights fact sheets</u> in English, Spanish, French, and Haitian Creole. Aimed at Cubans, Haitians, and others from Latin America who are humanitarian parole recipients, the fact sheet explains eligibility for healthcare services, translation and interpretation, privacy concerns and more.

NRC-RIM is working on several other health education collections for their <u>Afghan Health</u> <u>Portfolio</u>, including wildfire smoke, mental health and stress, and respiratory illnesses. These will be released over the next several weeks.

Webinars and Trainings

Culturally Relevant Lead Poisoning Prevention Strategies for Afghan Newcomer Communities

October 18, 2023 1 pm ET

A staggering 800 million children worldwide—nearly 1 in 3—are affected by lead poisoning. Refugee children, including Afghan children resettled in the United States, are disproportionately affected by lead exposures before they move to the U.S. This disproportionate impact continues even after resettlement because families may use imported products containing lead, such as cookware, cosmetics, and spices.

Seattle and King County Public Health (SKCPH) has been partnering with the Afghan Health Initiative (AHI) to prevent childhood lead poisoning in King County, Washington. Their efforts include home visits and a pressure cooker exchange program. AHI's community health advocates, trained to navigate linguistic and cultural issues, play a crucial role supporting home health visits.

The National Resource Center for Refugees, Immigrants, and Migrants (NRC-RIM) simultaneously created a collection of pre-translated and customizable communications materials for organizations and individuals working to prevent and address lead exposure and poisoning among Afghan newcomers. They are based on guidance from the CDC and state health departments, and they include Afghan cultural references for a tailored approach.
