What to Know About the Vaccine Provisions Included in the Inflation Reduction Act



Overview:

In August 2022, the Biden administration passed the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) which included provisions to eliminate out-of-pocket expenses for adult vaccines recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) for Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries.

When:

As of January 1, 2023, Medicare Part D beneficiaries have access to ACIP recommended adult vaccines. As of October 1, 2023, Medicaid beneficiaries will have access to ACIP recommended adult vaccines.

What does that mean for patients?

- Patients do not have to pay out of pocket for the vaccines listed if they are enrolled in Medicare Part D.
- Starting October 1, 2023, patients will not have to pay out of pocket for the vaccines listed if they are enrolled in Medicaid.
